What is a Sculpture?

Sculptures are Sculptures are three-dimensional works of art created by artists. They make sculptures by shaping materials like clay, wood, stone, metal, or even plastic into different shapes and forms. These forms can represent people, animals, objects, or even abstract ideas.


Sculptures can vary in size, from small ones you can hold in your hand to huge ones that are as tall as buildings.

What makes sculptures unique is that you can see them from all sides, not just from the front like a painting. So, you can walk all the way around a sculpture and look at it from every angle to see the details and how the artist created it.






natural pattern	Patterns designed following looking at things in the natural world
